MASTER RECYCLER SPOTLIGHT: A Recycled House(written by Ruth Olin)

I built and live in a recycled house. It takes a whole lot less energy and less of the planet's resources to use something that's already made – and for building materials, this is especially true. As a LEED AP* I know that green building certifications like LEED give points to recycled building materials and materials with recycled content. There are also points for material that is local, saving transportation cost – the energy and fuel needed to move the product. When choosing materials for my house, I not only thought about whether the material was recycled, but whether it recycle-able at the end of its useful life. The concept of recycle-ability becomes very important if we are to achieve a Cradle to Cradle system. Remember, Nature (our best model) recycles everything! Removing the need to cut new trees for lumber has many advantages: trees clean the air and provide oxygen, we are using up wood faster than we can grow it, and we have very little old growth wood left. Reclaimed lumber is often old growth lumber with vertical grain, and therefore stronger than the little stuff we harvest today.

I started with the premise that I would use everything that I could that was already on the site. Let's face it, it's a great idea - but not without its' challenges. I hired an experienced deconstruction team of three to deconstruct the house. I removed all the finishes and furnishings in advance, exposing the structure, so that they could concentrate on dismantling. It's hard dirty work but they were pros and did it in a couple days, sorting out all salvageable materials: copper, alum, fixtures, etc. which were donated to our Gorge Rebuild-it Center in Hood River and elsewhere as appropriate. Deconstruction costs about the same as demolition. We kept endless dumpsters out of the landfill and

provided the raw material for the new dwelling.

After the house is removed and the wood stacked, do you think the work is done?

No, that's just the beginning. The lumber needs to be further stripped of remaining drywall, wall paper, etc.; de-nailed, cut to length and graded, in order for it to be used structurally. Then it needs to be milled and surfaced. If you are gong to think about recycling building materials, be sure you have a dry storage location and start collecting long before you build. And that one nail you missed? It'll leave its mark on your cutting blades! I'm grateful that everyone I worked with was willing to go the extra mile to use reclaimed lumber. Now that Deconstruction is becoming a more common method of recycling buildings, there are more sophisticated tools available, like magnetic nail detectors. But it is certainly an art - as much so as putting a build-





I call my house a recycled house because almost all of the lumber is either recycled from the house that used to stand on the site, or purchased from the Gorge Rebuild-it Center. It is actually a straw bale house. Since straw is highly insulating, rapidly renewable (very much so as compared to wood) and considered a waste product, using straw in house construction also saves trees. In addition to lumber, a few of the recycled items used in my house are: kitchen and bath fixtures, cast iron radiators, hardware, tile, cabinets, lighting, and the list goes on.

What do we leave for the future? Our economic system doesn't cause manufacturing to bear the hidden cost of degradation to the environment or harm to people. That's why I think resource use ought to be taxed and incentives offered to those who reuse. And recycle. It just makes sense!
