You and your neighbors recycled more materials than ever before! In 2013, households and businesses in Hood River, Wasco and Sherman Counties set new recycling records and helped Oregon reach a new high in waste recovery – almost 54 percent! This is great news. When we recycle, we conserve our forests and mineral resources and use less energy to make products. And the recycling industry creates many more jobs than throwing away recyclable items, so recycling helps our economy too. Ten times more jobs than landfilling, according to EPA.

It's Easy to Recycle Right

We all want to make sure the items we put in our recycling bins or take to the depot are actually getting recycled, and don't end up at the landfill. For recycling to work though, manufacturers need to use recycled paper, plastic, steel or glass to make new products. Manufacturers buy those ingredients from large sorting facilities located in Portland where they prepare our mixed recyclables. When the wrong things get into our mixed recyclables, they are handled as contamination and often go to the landfill. That puts a strain on the entire recycling system and adds cost to our garbage service. That's why it's important to only put recyclable items in your blue bin and to prepare them properly.

If you're not sure whether an item is recyclable, don't put it in the bin. Then check our website to confirm that it is recyclable.

What Can I Recycle?

Comingled recycling instructions same for households and businesses.

COMINGLE

Put all of these in the same container . . .

- Newspapers, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, phone books
- Office paper, colored paper, note pads, letters, paper bags
- Shredded paper in a paper bag (less mess)
- Boxes, such as tissue, shoe, cookie, cereal, and cracker style boxes (liner removed)
- Cardboard tubes
- Plastic bottles with a neck (rinse)...like beverages, milk jugs, shampoo, detergent, cleansers. Now you can leave the cap on!
- Plastic tubs 6 oz. to 5 gallons in size (cleaned)...like dairy products, cat litter, detergent. Leave the lid on.
- Plant containers 4 inches and larger (cleaned)
- Aluminum cans and tin cans (rinsed)
- Clean aluminum
- Empty aerosol cans (remove plastic caps)



Did you know? Now you can leave the plastic caps and lids on your plastic bottles, jugs, and tubs and put them all in the bin together!

SEPARATE Keep these items separate . . .

- Glass bottles and jars (rinse, put metal lids in blue recycle bin). Put in a separate bucket or container.
- Corrugated cardboard boxes Flattened). Put these next to or underneath your blue bins.
- Motor oil (put in a gallon milk jug with a lid and place next to your garbage).

BUT WHAT ABOUT...

 Plastic shopping bags and bread sacks do not go in your blue bins. Please take them back to the grocery store for recycling.

Make compost at home. Place fruit & vegetable scraps, paper towels & napkins, lawn clippings & leaves in a compost bin, where they will break down.
