

Plastic bags jammed in recycling equipment


Too Many Phone Books?

Reduce Waste + Recycle More

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Sustainability...what does that mean anyway?

To live well without taking more than our planet has to offer...to live "within your means" environmentally and have less of an impact on the earth... because future generations are depending on the choices vou make todav.

What does recycling have to do with sustainability? A big part of sus-

tainability is making our natural resources last as long as possible for this generation...and future generations. If we use something just once, like an aluminum pop can, and then just toss it in the garbage, it's gone. The raw materials and energy used to make that can, plus all the human effort to make it, move it, fill it, and use it....are lost to us, buried in a landfill.

When we recycle something, we give it another life...and sometimes many other lives. That aluminum can be re-made into another can, a baseball bat, a window, or a pie plate...instead of getting



"trashed" and never used again. That saves a lot of energy as well as a lot of raw materials. For example, US recycling activity conserves significant amounts of energy. The US **Environmental Protection** Agency estimates that our current recycling efforts save 1.4 quadrillion BTU, the equivalent to 11.3

billion gallons of gas! This represents 56 power plants that we didn't have to build in the U.S. because of recycling. (From U.S. EPA website: www.epa.gov/climatechange)

Recycling as an industry also creates jobs and economic activity. In general, it creates six times as many jobs as sending waste to a landfill. Recycling strengthens the economy by creating jobs, using vendors, and manufacturing products. Although the markets for recycled materials have been affected by the global economic downturn, they will come back eventually. 
What can you bring?

Home Medical Waste

SHARPS (discarded needles, syringes, lancets)

Protect people from getting hurt or cut

- Do not throw these into the trash
- Use an approved sharps container (no coffee cans or pop bottles)
- 1. Sharps containers available for purchase at pharmacies and medical supply stores
- 2. FREE disposal of filled sharps containers at local transfer stations:

UNUSED MEDICATIONS

Protect young children from accidental poisonings. Prevent intentional misuse of drugs, especially by teenagers and young adults.

- Do not flush medicines down the drain or toilet, this can pollute the water supply
- Do not burn household waste containing pharmaceuticals
- Wrap and conceal the products for disposal in the trash
- 1. Keep medicines in original containers
- 2. Remove or conceal any personal information on labels
- 3. Mix in a substance such as flour, used coffee grounds, kitty litter or dirt
- 4. Tape lid if not child-proof and there are children in the home
- 5. Place in plastic, sealable bag and "hide" in another container in the trash

In the future, Oregon hopes to develop a "drug take-back" program for safe and convenient collection and disposal of unused and unwanted medications.

Remember, you can now take old televisions, computer towers, laptops and monitors for FREE RECYCLING at local Oregon E-Cycles centers

The Oregon E-Cycles program was created by Oregon's Electronics Recycling Law and financed by the electronics manufacturers. It provides FREE recycling of computer towers, laptop computers, monitors and televisions to anyone with seven or fewer items to recycle at one time.

BLUE BINS can't recycle these:

- Plastic bags and shrink wrap (film)
- Styrofoam
- Clear "clamshell" packages (for fruit or baked goods)
- Plastic fruit baskets (for berries)
- Blister packaging (for batteries or household items)
- Biodegradable or compostable plastics
- Motor oil bottles
